Membership:

Save The Date/Reminder:

Meetings are held quarterly o the second Wednesday of January, April, July and October @ 4pm. The January meeting is held at the Chamber of Commerce at the corner of Hwy 89 and 70, next to the White Barn. The April, July, and October meetings will be held at the Graeagle Coffee Shop, downtown. All members are encouraged to attend.

Graeagle Fire Protection District:

The Graeagle Fire Protection District is reminding people that it can be dangerous to dispose of fireplace, wood stove or barbeque ashes. Embers, often concealed in what appears to be cold ashes, can remain hot enough to kindle a fire for several days. It is recommended to wait at least 4 days before disposing of ashes.

"With the extremely dry conditions we have been experiencing, everyone should be extra vigilant with ash disposal," says Fire Chief Ed Ward. "Hot ashes have caused structure fires when left next to a home, garage, deck or when dumped on pine needles or other flammable materials."

To safely dispose of ashes:

- Put discarded ashes in a heavy metal container, douse with water and cover with a fitted metal lid.
- Store container outside and away from structures, decks, fences, wood piles and other combustible materials.
- Never use a vacuum to pick up ashes.
- Never put ashes in bags or boxes.
- After sitting for a week in the metal container, check them again to be sure they are cool. If so, the ashes are then ready to be disposed of in your trash.

As the fall and winter heating season approaches, please remember to regularly inspect and clean your chimney. Soot and creosote are combustible materials that accumulate inside chimneys and create a dangerous fire hazard unless they are removed.

Other general fire safety tips for the home heating season

- Make sure you have working smoke alarms on every level of your home, outside each sleeping area and inside each bedroom.
- Test the alarms at least once a month.
- Change the batteries in your smoke alarms twice a year.

- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet from space heaters and other heat sources.
- Keep candles and matches out of the reach of children.
- Extinguish all fires, even candles, when you leave the room or go to sleep.
- Remember to call 911 for all fires, no matter how small.

Care Flight in the Neighborhood:

Care Flight is developing a new base in Plumas County. Having served the North Eastern California and Northern Nevada region for nearly 35 years, the air ambulance program is expanding its service area. To better serve our partners in Plumas County, Care Flight has entered into negotiations for a base at the Nervino Airport in Beckwourth, Ca.

Care Flight was the first in the area to offer air ambulance service and was pioneers in the air medical industry. The medical crews are trained in critical care assessments, expanded scope of practice and procedures. Care Flight brings the critical care unit to the patient.

Care Flight has a fleet of 4 Helicopters. Care Flight's pilots have extensive pilot in command time with training in high altitude operations. *Flight Plan* is a membership program which helps alleviate some out of pocket expenses for members. The plan covers all members of the household for only \$55 per year. Care Flight has a reciprocal agreement with Enloe medical Center's Flight Care helicopter air ambulance program based in Chico. A membership in Care Flight's program will benefit someone traveling to the West. (See the agreements for both program details). Care Flight is extending an offer to the GPOA to join the Flight Plan Membership program for the group rate of \$30.00 if you note 'Graeagle Property Owners Association' on the application.

Eastern Plumas Health Care:

Eastern Plumas Health Care is a non-profit hospital providing comprehensive medical services to Plumas and Sierra County residents. We operate a 24 hour, physician staffed emergency room and ambulance service; four medical clinics (Graeagle, Greenville, Loyalton and Portola); 2 Dental Clinics (Portola- we will be taking over Dr. Mario Garibotti's practice on Jan.1, and we also offer dental care on our Portola hospital campus); 2 skilled nursing facilities (Portola and Loyalton) with a total of 66 beds, one acute care hospital with nine beds and a robust Telemedicine program.

We offer a full range of in and outpatient services, including a full service lab, x-ray, digital mammography, ultrasound, CT, MRI, respiratory therapy, nutritionist services, scheduled outpatient procedures and surgeries (we share a top rated surgeon, who just moved here from Sacramento in December, with Plumas District Hospital in Quincy- he will see clinic patients in Portola and schedule their surgeries in Quincy), and finally, we offer hospice services in collaboration with Tahoe Forest Hospital.

To serve our community, we have three full time Primary Care Physicians, and three full time Family Nurse Practitioners, as well as several part time practitioners. EPHC also has specialists on staff in the following areas: Cardiology, Dentistry, Gastroenterology, Gynecology, Internal Medicine, Neurology, Obstetrics, Orthopedics, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, Podiatry and Urology (beginning in December). We will add a highly qualified Board Certified Dermatologist early in the New Year.

Our Graeagle Clinic (836-1122) offers Primary care appointments, walkin appointments, and specialty services, including: Cardiology, Internal medicine, Physical Medicine/Rehabilitation, and Urology. The clinic also has a lab draw station (call for lab hours).

Perhaps most important to Graeagle residents is the fact that they can count on an ambulance arriving within 10-15 minutes of a 911 call (ambulance staff leave within 2-3 minutes of receiving a call any time day or night). Often local volunteer services will be on hand even sooner. If you're transported by ambulance, emergency staff will be waiting for your arrival at the hospital and will have been receiving EKG readings from the field if necessary. Depending on the severity of the emergency, you'll either be stabilized or transported via ambulance or Care Flight to a Reno hospital, or you'll be observed and/or admitted to our acute care hospital if your case is one we can take care of here at home. We also offer rehabilitation services and short as well as long term skilled nursing care, so that you or your family member can be close to home, near family and friends while healing.

Johnsville Historic Ski Bowl (JHSB) Update:

With snow finally falling, Eastern Plumas Recreation District (EPRD) has been able to leverage several improvements made over the last few years and provide limited winter operations that kicked off over the 3 days following Christmas. The first ever "Sledding Days" event was a big success in helping reinvigorate interest in the development of the ski hill and providing expanded winter recreation opportunities for all ages. The Intorf Lodge was open with a fire roaring all 3 days. Food and non-alcoholic drinks were provided for sale with lower slopes all groomed for winter enthusiasts including sledders, boarders, skiers and snowshoes. Over 300 people attended. The event was "donation requested" with no charge. All proceeds go back towards improvements on the hill and help cover any administrative costs @ EPRD. The event netted over \$1000 after expenses and another event is planned (see below).

Investments in 2015 included rebuilding maintenance shed to house groomer and increase space for storing equipment, and clearing of vegetation of bunny hill behind lodge for expanded sledding areas. Groomer was donated by Stover Mountain ski area a few years ago and went through a discounted service and repair process mid 2015 by Pisten Bully in Reno. In addition, upgrades to water well system were completed in 2015. The groomer shed rebuild and well improvements were made possible through state grant funds and many hard working volunteers. Next priority improvement is the bathroom, with ADA compliant structure in place as a goal. Finishing the installation of the double chair Main Line ski lift purchased from Squaw Valley is the biggest goal with additional funding still required.

2015 was a momentum year with several fund raising events held on the hill, including the first ever "Pizza Throw down" contest hosted by Plumas Ski Club and EPRD in early May. The 3rd annual Lost Sierra Hoedown featuring 30 bands and camping over 4 days in late September and the first Sledding Days event held at the end of December. A second Sledding Days event is scheduled for MLK weekend in conjunction with the Long board Races on Sunday, hosted by Plumas Ski Club. More of these community type events are planned through winter and summer of 2016. Now is required for winter events and volunteers are always in demand to keep the progress and improvements continuing.
